One of the earliest existing documents involving Dunton. The Final concord between Roger, Margery and Milo De Bray, and the Augustinian Priory of Haliwell & Magdalena the Prioress, giving half a Virgate of land at Dunton (1181-1188).

Introduction

A parish plan is based on a survey carried out by and for the local community. It is a means of taking stock of the community and creating a sound foundation of awareness and understanding on which to base future community action by identifying local strengths, needs, opportunities, problems, and threats.

This report has been prepared by a small working party of around 7 residents with input from Dunton Parish Council and Bedfordshire Rural Communities Charity. It summarises and analyses the responses made to a questionnaire which was delivered to each dwelling in the Parish of Dunton (Dunton, Millow & Newton) in early 2010 and makes recommendations for future action

Given the significant number of people who responded, to whom the working party would like to pass on their thanks, this report can accurately be described as reflecting the views of the community and its vision for how it wants the parish to develop. It then identifies the actions needed to achieve the vision.

Dunton- The Historical Backdrop.

Dunton is a small village within the civil parish of Dunton Village and the hamlets of Millo & Newtonbury located in Bedfordshire. The parish covers nearly 2,750 acres, and is bounded on the south-east by Cambridgeshire and Hertfordshire, from which it is separated by the River Rhee.

At the time of the Domesday Survey, Richard Pungiant held in Dunton 8 hides and 1 virgate of the King in Chief. This manor, part of which became later known as Dunton Chamberlain or Newtonbury, had formerly belonged to Archbishop Stigand. In 1200 the King granted the overlordship of this manor to William Brewer, but after his death in 1227, it reverted to the crown, and was henceforth held by the service of one-tenth of a knight's fee.

Over the following 300 years the three Manor houses of Millo, Newtonbury and Dunton (Goyes) passed through various ownerships eventually consolidating around 1600 into the ownership by the Spencer family.

Robert Spencer, grandson of William and second earl of Sunderland, held Dunton Goyes in 1662 and his son Charles, who died in 1722, left the property to a younger son John, who was created Earl Spencer in 1765.

After enclosure by Parliament in 1797 it continued to remain in the direct line of the Spencer family until 1812.

In 1871, the village had two blacksmiths, three thatchers, a needlemaker, and a cobbler as well as boasting five public houses. Of these, only one public house remains in current use with many - like the old Bakehouse - only a memory through street or house names.

With its ridge location, Dunton also became "famous" (as shown in the current village sign) for its 'docks' -a pond on the outskirts of the village, so called because the steam engines would stop there to fill up with water which supported the huge growth in mechanised farming at the turn of the late 1800s and the development of the cable plough which helped maintain the essentially rural feel of the village.

Whilst the bulk of the current housing stock outside of the main village centre is from the second half of the 20^{th} Century the village still remains dominated by the 750 year old St Mary's Church. The first mention that has been found of a church is in 1189, when Richard I confirmed its possession to the priory of Holywell. No remains from this period are in evidence and the present building was mainly constructed during the 14 & 15^{th} centuries, with the tower representing a more modern (1800s) addition.

Whilst some remains are in evidence at Newton of the old manor buildings, the parish, in addition to the church, have a further three Grade II listed buildings all found in Millow: Millow Bury (17th Century), Millow Hill Farmhouse (17th Century) and two cottages, numbers 12-14 (18th Century) on the hamlet edge.

Dunton in the 21st Century

With a population of 722 the parish still retains an essentially rural feel although fewer and fewer people are engaged in traditional rural activities.

Despite the loss of the Post Office in 2006 and the short-term closure of the Pub, local facilities are thriving with active use of the Village Hall (pre-school, clubs & societies), recreation field (football and play area), Dunton VC School, Church groups and the Community Garden.

The groups and societies range from the traditional WI, 3 book groups through to the oil buying group.

Why have a Parish Plan?

A plan for Dunton, based on the views of the residents, can help to make a difference to the village's future. It sets out villagers' priorities and concerns and an action plan for addressing these over the next five years. In particular, it will inform the Parish Council and other bodies about residents' wishes so that decisions can be made democratically, based on reliable information. The Plan will assist them in setting of budgets, choosing projects to support and responding to consultations by outside bodies such as Central Bedfordshire Council and central Government. It is known that grant applications for village improvements will have a far greater chance of success in winning funding when supported by a Parish Plan. Dunton's Parish Plan is, therefore, an action plan for the village.

How was this Plan developed?

A working group comprising volunteers from the village was set up in early 2009. Bedfordshire Rural Communities Charity gave this group help, support and advice at all stages. It reviewed plans drawn up by other villages in Bedfordshire. Grants were obtained from the Parish Council to cover expenses such as printing and room hire. A series of consultation exercises were held through 2009 including "Planning for Real". Community groups were asked to identify 'likes' and 'dislikes' and contributions were sought from under 8s through the school and from young people via a visit from the Bedfordshire "RAVE" bus amongst others.

These activities helped the group devise a questionnaire for people aged over 8 which was then sent to every household at the end of June 2010. Of the 270 distributed, 156 completed questionnaires were returned. From the analysed results, 328 individual responses were received representing views for 45.4% of the total village population (722-2001). These responses have informed the proposals set out in the accompanying action plan, a more detailed version is available on the village web site and in the March Hare, Village Hall, Church, DRA pavilion and Community Garden The Parish Council was asked to comment on these draft proposals and they were also presented, for comment, to a village open meeting. The final report was presented to the Parish Council in May 2011 and the action plan approved for adoption to inform priorities over the next five years.

What Happens now?

Following distribution of the action plan to all households in the village, the Parish Council, Central Bedfordshire Council and to other agencies, its implementation will be monitored by the successor to the Parish Plan working group - the Parish Plan Action Group- who will produce an annual progress report to the village. Whilst the Parish Council will play a key role in implementing the plan, it is critical that all local groups and clubs also actively support the Parish Plan Action Group's work.

It is anticipated that some projects will be funded by the Parish Council, whilst others will need funding from sources such as local authorities, grant giving bodies and local fund raising. Some projects will need little or no funding.

The Proposals and Action Plan

Introduction and explanation of the data collected and used.

This Action Plan and the proposals in it reflect the issues of particular concern to our residents. These issues emerged from the consultation exercises which took place in the Parish over 2009-2010 culminating in the distribution of the questionnaire to all habitable households in the parish resulting in the 156 (57.8%) returns.

Calculation of data from Questionnaire.

Following an initial age profile of all household members, all questions sought responses from all individuals (over 8 years old) within the household.

Not all questions were answered by, or were relevant to all households.

For all questions where a household reply was more relevant, 156, the number of returned questionnaires, was taken to be the denominator for the percentage of household responses.


For all questions where an individual reply was more relevant, 328, the number unique individual responses to any question, was taken to be the denominator for the percentage of individual responses.

Respondents' Profile

Based on the last UK census the Parish of Dunton had a resident population of 722* individuals living in one of the 270 habitable dwellings.

Our survey, when collated received replies from 328 (45.4%) individuals from 156 (57.8%) of the households representing a significant proportion of the population and households and therefore provide a valid sample for providing a summarised view of the Parish.

In addition to the overall figures, when comparing against the age % from the Census (without adjustment for the removal of 0-8 year olds from our survey) we can also see we have good representation from all age groups ensuring the widest possible assortment of views.



Input was also elicited from people outside of the Parish but with strong connections to the life of the village
and have been included within the main body of respondents.
